The Nuisance That Arise From Overcharging Cellphone Batteries

Even though you are charging your battery on your cell phone you are not getting an even amount of energy to your battery, energy only gets used when you are taking or receiving calls, sending or receiving texts or using the apps on the phone.

With the cost of a replacement battery anywhere in the region of \$80, you do not really need to run the risk of overcharging your battery. Therefore you should really be charging your battery for a few hours but with the unit switched off.

Some people freely admit to keeping their cell phones on overnight in case they miss a call, and they think that this is an ideal opportunity to charge it up as well - not so! If there was a way to invent some cell phone that could record missed calls with the unit switched off, you would not need to keep it on all night long.

You will get longer life from your battery if you only charge it up when it is actually needed.
