The definition of uptime is the time period in which a particular system can be allowed to run without crashing or having to be started up again, often known in computing as rebooting. This is most often, nowadays, referred to within the world of computer science although it is quite possible for it to be used when speaking of other systems. Be they mechanical or electronic.

Administrative purposes is the usual reason why rebooting takes place as it helps keep the system clean and up to date. This is important as glitches can occasionally occur and therefore anything that could go wrong needs to be cleaned up, so to speak. A lot of people might realize that this is often the cause of certain websites, very occasionally, going down and not being available on the Internet for a certain time.

Availability, or what is also known as high availability, is something not quite the same although it is easy to confuse the two. In essence this term will refer to the users of a particular system and their ability to access its services. Normally, people will want to be able to access it at all times and therefore high availability is something that is desired.

This should not be confused with the likes of uptime as it is simply whenever a system isn't there for customers or users to gain access to. However, when this isn't possible it is known as being unavailable. The term "downtime" is also used in this context, and as such these two slightly differing terms have more or less the same opposite in website hosting.

Businesses and individuals who normally webhosting and web services and other similar systems are going to have to deal with times when their systems experience downtime. This can be used to go over things manually or automatically if they wish. Whilst it can cause some frustration for those on the other end, the best time for this is when there are very few users.

Clients and businesses alike are always going to be searching for the best. By nature people are impatient, and want to access their systems immediately and have them working all the time. Nobody likes it if they switch on a television and find that a channel is down for repairs. Normally if something like this happens, people will flick over and look for something else. In a consumerist society, instant gratification is a key point.

A business could find that it can increase its productivity if its downtime is decreased, hence gaining more views, customers and the likes of residual income which can be a great moneymaker.
